## Mabe Parish is developing a neighbourhood plan

The Parish Council has supported the development of a neighbourhood development plan to cover the whole of Mabe Parish and we need our community to get involved and help us to get it right.

### What is Neighbourhood planning ?

Neighbourhood planning gives communities the opportunity to set out their vision for their neighbourhood and shape development and growth (housing, industry, infrastructure) in their local area. A neighbourhood plan bolts under Cornwall Council's Local Plan to strengthen and add local detail to how development should happen in Mabe.

This means we can do our best to take control and ensure local building projects benefit Mabe, fit with our ideals and reduce the amount of time we have to spend fighting inappropriate development imposed on us.

With an NDP we can put in place planning polices that will help deliver our ideal vision to enhance our community. It will also mean that we secure more money from development to invest in community infrastructure than without it.

*Who does all the work?*

A steering group will be responsible for developing the whole NDP. Members will come from the Parish Council, local businesses and the community at large.

Groups will focus on smaller areas within the whole plan – it could mean looking into traffic & transport, housing, tourism links, talking to local businesses, assessing community facilities and needs – really it is up to the parish as a whole to decide where to start and what to include.

*How can I get involved?*

To date a small handful of the local community most affected by recent development issues in the village have started off but WE NEED YOU NOW to get in-

olved.

We are looking for passionate people from every corner of the Mabe Community to come and help do the work, provide ideas, and make this happen. We want as many Mabe residents as possible to input into its production so we get it right for us and all future communities of our wonderful home.

## Mabe schoolgirl gets the chop!

Lowenna Livermore has just turned 7 years old, but she was still only 6 when she decided to cut her beautiful long hair to help people with cancer.

It was her first ever haircut and she was pretty nervous about it, but she had seen a video on YouTube of another girl who had had her haircut to make wigs for children who had lost their hair during cancer treatment.

Lowenna went to Plymouth to have her hair cut by her auntie who took off 11 ½ inches!

Lowenna also raised £584 in sponsorship which she added to the fundraising at Mabe School where she is a pupil. Everyone at

the school wanted to help raise money for the new centre at Treliske when one of the teachers, Mrs Fisher became ill and Lowenna has managed to help cancer sufferers twice, with money and by donating her hair.

Lowenna loves being in Class 2 at Mabe School. She enjoys Maths, Art, Writing and project work. Her favourite colour is green and she likes dogs and unicorns.

Lowenna thinks the best thing about living in Mabe is that everyone is kind. She said it is funny having short hair, she keeps think it is stuck down the back of her jumper, but it isn't.

## Fundraiser for Alexandra Phillips' wheelchair

Alexandra Phillips soon will be returning home to Mabe after a serious collision left her in hospital for nearly a year.

Last year, her car was in a head-on collision with a coach on the A393 Lanner road and she sustained a fractured jaw and four broken ribs, alongside a serious head injury which led to a traumatic brain injury. Doctors said she had a less than ten per cent chance of survival.

Alexandra spent weeks battling for her life, including 5 weeks in a coma, before her condition sta-

bilised, and she has spent the last six months in Mount Gould hospital's neuro-rehabilitation unit in Plymouth.

Alexandra's mum, Sarah Evans, said: "She defied all odds really. She's a miracle."

When asked what she was looking forward to most about Alexandra's homecoming, Sarah said: "Just having her about, she's my best friend as well as my daughter. Just to have her home and be part of normal family life again and just spend more time with her."

She added: "She's a very strong, determined, focused young woman so I'm sure she will be fighting and battling constantly to be living independently again."

Alexandra is a "real outdoors person", and godparents Helena and Jamie Truen have set up a fundraiser for an all-terrain wheelchair so that she can properly appreciate the countryside.

"We want her to be able to have the chance to do all the things that she loves the most - spending time on the beach or in the woods with her dog Doug and also going to the field to visit her two gorgeous horses."

"We feel that being able to do the things that she loves so much will have a massive positive

Cont. from opposite impact on her continuing recovery.”

Before the accident, Alexandra worked full time as a Finance Assistant and lived with her partner in their own home that they had bought the previous year, now she will need 24 hour care.

The Crowdfunder had raised over £6000 at the time of writing, with a £10,000 goal to cover the cost of the all-terrain wheelchair.

When: Various times between 11am and 4pm.


What: Preparing and serving drinks, snacks and light refreshments to our visitors. Clearing and washing crockery and utensils. Taking payments.

## Signs for the Future

The fingerpost in Halvasso was one of the finest examples of its kind, giving directions to 10 locations from Truro to The Lizard. Some villages have a square, but the Halvasso sign post is on the Triangle. Over time it became rusty and chipped and eventually lost one of its fingers. The council don't restore the old Cornish finger posts anymore because they are not recognised as valid sign posts now.

However the people of Halvasso spear-headed by the Cox and Dewar families came together to repair and renovate the finger post adding a handsome new finial on the top.

The new fingerpost was celebrated with a tea party in the Cox polytunnel, where despite the

rain members of the village turned out to eat cake and commemorate the moment with a poem by Halvasso's resident poet, Vince Fenner. An extract of the poem is published below. Don't forget to have a look at the sign if you come through Halvasso.

## Can you spot the dolphin?

*Robert Beeman of the Cornwall Astronomy Society tells us what to look out for in the skies above us during June and July.*

In the south-eastern sky, the first thing to appear at dusk is the Summer Triangle, formed by the three bright, white stars Vega, Deneb and Altair. The Milky Way traverses the Triangle, within which lies the star Sadr; in Arabic "the breast" due to its position in the constellation of Cygnus the Swan. William Herschel, the discoverer of Uranus in 1781 declared the area around Sadr as the "stariest place in the northern heavens".

Locate Deneb, and then extend a line downwards through Sadr to Alberio, one of the most spectacular double stars in the night sky; even a small telescope will reveal the contrasting blue and gold/yellow of the two compo-

nents, well worth a look even if you have seen it before.

On the western bank of the Milky Way below Cygnus, look out for the little leaping dolphin, Delphinus, one of the smallest constellations of the northern sky. Close by is Sagitta the Arrow aimed at Vulpecula the Little Fox.

Moving east and south from Cygnus low on the horizon you should be able to find Antares, a red supergiant about 600ly away. This has a very faint blue companion star in a 900 year orbit.

Further to the west and at about the same altitude as Antares is Spica which is a blue white main sequence star about 260ly. The Greek astronomer Hipparchus (190-120BC) discovered a small historical shift in the star's position caused by the slow "wobble" of the Earth's axis which gives us the precession of the equinoxes.

At around midnight, end of June early July there will be a very nice arrangement of planets and stars with Jupiter and Antares almost due south, Saturn to the east and Spica to the west. Although all will be low on the horizon (you may need to seek higher ground to get a clear horizon), if you pick a night when the Moon is not in the south it should be a fine sight.



## Garden Club wins at Falmouth Spring Flower Show

The George Sowden Trophy is awarded for the best display by a group, and must include: 6 different daffodils staged in 2 vases, 3 stems to each; 3 different camellias; 1 flowering pot plant; 1 foliage pot plant; and 1 pot cactior succulent.

Other club winners included Val Bidgood, who took first place


